# The power behind your power

As April arrives, it brings the showers that produce spring flowers. It also heralds the beginning of a potentially stormy season that can inherently include power outages. While KEM Electric Cooperative strives to provide reliable electricity to our members, there are times when Mother Nature has other plans. Most of us can ride out a storm from

the comfort and convenience of our homes. However, there is a group of professionals who spring into action when the weather takes a turn for the worst – co-op lineworkers.

#### A dangerous job

Braving stormy weather and other challenging conditions, lineworkers often must climb 40 or more feet into the air, carrying heavy equipment, to restore power. Listed as one of the 10 most dangerous jobs in the United States, lineworkers must perform detailed tasks next to high-voltage power lines. To help keep them safe, lineworkers wear specialized protective clothing and equipment at all times when on the job. This includes special fireresistant clothing that will self-extinguish, limiting potential injuries from burns and sparks. Insulated and rubber gloves are worn in tandem to protect them from electrical shock. While the gear performs a critical function, it also adds additional weight and bulk, making the job more complex.

In addition to the highly visible tasks lineworkers perform, their job today goes far beyond climbing to the top of a pole to repair a wire. They are also information experts who can pinpoint an outage from miles away and restore power remotely. Line crews use their laptops and cellphones to map outages, take photos of the work they have done and troubleshoot problems. In our community, KEM Electric

lineworkers are responsible for keeping over 2,700 miles of line across four counties working to bring power to your home and our local community 24/7, regardless of the weather, holidays or personal considerations.

While lineworkers may be the most visible employees at KEM Electric, it's important to note there is a team of highly skilled professionals working behind the scenes. Engineers provide ongoing expertise and quidance on the operations side of the co-op. Member service representatives are always standing by to take your calls and answer your questions. Our information technology experts are continuously monitoring our system to help safeguard sensitive data. And these are just a few of the folks who work together to ensure we can deliver the service and reliability you expect and deserve. Without them, our lineworkers wouldn't be able to "bring the light" to our community.

Our dedicated and beloved lineworkers are proud to represent KEM Electric, and they deserve all the appreciation and accolades that come their way on Lineworker Appreciation Day.

On April 10, and any time you see a lineworker, I hope you'll join me in thanking them for their exceptional service. I also hope you'll remember you have a dedicated team of professionals working behind the scenes at the co-op whose commitment to service runs just as deep.





# Safety Starts with ME: Martin Messer

Spring is upon us. As the weather gets warmer and days get longer, we can't help but think of the landscaping projects we've been dreaming about during the cold, winter months.

"If any of your spring projects require digging, such as planting trees or shrubs or setting posts, remember to dial 811 first," said Martin Messer, KEM Electric's Steele area foreman.

From gas lines to water and electric lines, one wrong plow, harrow or shovel into the ground can lead to disaster and set your project timeline back significantly. Here are the steps to take when dialing 811:

**Call** – Upon dialing 811, you will be routed to a local "one call" center.

**Provide information** – Tell the operator where you're planning to dig and what type of project you are working on. By doing this, the affected local utilities will be notified of this information.

**Wait** – Within a few days after the initial call, a locator will come to the site and mark any underground lines, pipes and cables. This designated person will mark these areas with flags or paint.

**Time to dig** – After this process is complete, you may start your digging to achieve your landscaping dreams!

"Do-it-yourself projects are great and fun, as long as you do it right," Messer said. "Many homeowners are aware of the significance in calling before you dig, However, many do not take advantage of it."

A national survey showed that only 50% of homeowners called to have their lines marked



before starting digging projects, according to the Common Ground Alliance (CGA). CGA data also shows that an underground utility line is damaged every six minutes in the United States.

The simplest of tasks can damage underground lines, causing outages, damaging utility lines, harming diggers and possibly resulting in repair costs and fines, which is why it is so important to play it safe and dial 811 beforehand.

KEM Electric wants to not only keep underground utilities safe, but most importantly, keep you safe, too.

Your electric cooperative is not owned by faraway investors, and it is not overseen by an appointed board of directors. Your electric cooperative is operated by a democratically elected board given the privilege to serve because of your vote.

At this year's annual meeting, not only will you have a blast (and maybe win a prize!), but you

will feel good knowing you had a voice in an important decision that impacts one of our most vital resources, electricity.

# KEM offers another option for cooperative voting process for director/bylaw amendment

During this year's voting process for your cooperative directors and the bylaw amendment, KEM Electric Cooperative will be offering another voting option – online voting. As in the past, your cooperative will continue to offer the opportunity to vote by mail-in ballot or to vote in-person at the annual meeting on June 15.

If a member casts a timely vote prior to the meeting by mail or online, the member will not receive a ballot at the annual meeting. Members will receive an annual meeting report in the mail around May 20. In a separate second mailing, members will receive a voting packet after May 20 with voting instructions for all three options. Please vote by mail or online, unless you know you will be attending the annual meeting.

## RDFC announces 2023 allotment

The Rural Development Finance Corporation (RDFC) is a North Dakota nonprofit finance and development corporation whose member-owners are all the North Dakota electric cooperatives, nine of the North Dakota telecommunication cooperatives and the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives.

RDFC announces it has approved a 2023 grant allotment of \$3,000 per member-cooperative to be used to support community-owned entities, nonprofits and community-based projects.

Eligible projects include: community-owned businesses (cafe, grocery store, motel, other); community facilities (ambulance services, fire districts, recreation, hospital/clinic, community center, other); or community-based projects (school/youth projects, other) that benefit rural areas and lead to community betterment.

Please note RDFC does not provide funds for medical fundraisers or general operating costs.

Matching funds include \$4 of other funds to every \$1 of RDFC funds. RDFC will not require documentation.

The minimum grant amount is \$500; the maximum is \$3,000. The limit is \$3,000 per member-cooperative for 2023.
