## KEM Electric powers into 2024 and beyond

KEM Electric Cooperative is continuously looking for ways to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the infrastructure and communications to best serve you, our members. The team at KEM Electric has been planning 2024 projects well in advance and crews will now be making updates and completing projects. This will ensure KEM Electric can deliver efficient and reliable power to members.

Along with infrastructure upgrades, the KEM Electric staff is working to meet members around the service area through local events and to inform members about information that may benefit them, such as scholarships and grant opportunities.

#### **Ensuring reliable power**

The operations department has been working to update and maintain infrastructure to continue to ensure reliability for members, says Chief of Staff/Line Superintendent Dale Nagel.

Nagel notes projects for the year include general maintenance of infrastructure, which consists of pole testing and pole changeouts, as well as noting clearance issues. The crews will also work to convert overhead lines to underground.

"Ensuring safe, efficient and reliable power for our members is the highest priority for KEM Electric," Nagel says. "Continuing to maintain and upgrade lines

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in our service area helps us do just that."

The cooperative plans to continue utilizing and installing technologies to improve the systems and workflow. This includes trip saver technology, which saves on maintenance and replacement, as well as leads to shorter or even fewer outages. A trip saver acts like a breaker in your home when an outage occurs.

#### Connecting with members

Over the year, KEM Electric has been looking for ways to meet members where they are to answer questions and serve as a resource. As a new way to meet with members, KEM Electric hosted member appreciation events. These events included sausage, knoephla and kraut, along with the opportunity to visit with KEM Electric directors, CEOs and staff.

KEM Electric will be hosting its annual meeting on Tuesday, June 11, in Linton at Our Club, formally the Knights of Columbus Hall.

"We enjoyed being able to connect with members at these events and look forward to connecting throughout the year," says Manager of Member Relations Marcy Sanders.

#### Serving the service area

KEM Electric also continues to provide scholarships through area schools and Basin Electric Power Cooperative. At the annual meeting in June, students will also have the chance to win luck-of-the-draw scholarships.

A new program KEM Electric unveiled for the 2023-24 school year is the KEM Electric Touchstone Energy® Student of the Month sponsorship. This sponsorship is available to any student at schools in KEM Electric's service area. A student is randomly chosen and awarded funds to use how they choose within his or her school. In March, a student from Wishek Public School will be chosen.

KEM Electric also offers a handful of grant opportunities throughout the year. Some of these programs include Operation Round Up, which is a voluntary contribution through rounding up electric bills to the next dollar. Funds will be disbursed in the general service area of KEM Electric solely for educational, charitable, safety or scientific purposes by a designated Operation Round Up board. #### SAFETY STARTS WITH ME:

## **Surge protection 101**

Behind the walls of your home is a network of wires that ensures the seamless journey of electricity from the power line to your outlet. Sometimes, the unexpected occurs and an increase in voltage can happen. These are known as power surges.

"Power surges can be caused by lightning, electrical overload, faulty wiring, power outages or other reasons," says Kirk Praus, a journeyman lineworker.

Regardless of the cause, power surges can majorly damage electronic devices and equipment in your home.

"Members can take precautions to prevent the impact surges can have on their electronics," Praus says.

#### Lightning

Lightning is one of the most common causes of power surges. Most of us have experienced this during a severe thunderstorm. When lightning strikes an electrical system, the excess current must be channeled somewhere. Unfortunately, it's sometimes sent through a home. Your best bet is to unplug all unused devices and electronics during severe thunderstorms.

#### **Electronic overload**

Electronic overload is another common cause of power surges. This happens when devices or appliances are plugged into an outlet that can't handle the required amount of voltage or if multiple devices are plugged into one outlet through an extension cord. If you're experiencing power surges due to electrical overload, it's time to call a qualified electrician to evaluate your home's circuits and electrical needs.

#### Faulty wiring

Faulty wiring in a home can also cause power surges. Damaged or exposed wires can cause spikes in voltage, creating a potentially dangerous situation. If you notice signs of faulty wiring, like visible burns on outlets, buzzing sounds from outlets or frequently tripped circuit breakers, your home may be due for electrical wiring repairs and updates.

#### **Power outages**

Surges can also occur after a power outage. Sometimes, when electricity is being restored and reconnected, it's common to experience a quick surge in current. It's best to unplug sensitive electronics during an outage. Then, wait to plug them back in after power is fully restored.

#### How to prepare for surges

Although KEM Electric Cooperative does its best to provide members with steady, reliable energy, surges



can occur.

"Aside from unplugging devices when you suspect a power surge, there are two ways members can take additional precautions to protect electronics in their homes," Praus says.

Devices like power strips can protect electronics during most surges.

"Not all power strips include surge protection, so it is important to read the packaging label carefully before you buy, and don't overload the power strip with too many devices," Praus says. You can also install specialized electrical outlets that offer additional surge protection.

"Another option is a whole-home surge protector, which can help protect your home from larger, more powerful surges," Praus suggests. In most cases, whole-home suppressors are connected to your home's service panel and include features like thermal fuses and notification capabilities that indicate when a device has been impacted by a surge.

#### Safety Starts with ME (& YOU)!

Safety is the highest priority at KEM Electric not only for employees, but also for members in their homes.

"We hope these tips help familiarize members with what is in their home and make changes if needed to their power outlets," Praus says. "While occasional power surges are inevitable, simply unplugging devices when you think a surge may occur and using additional levels of protection will ensure a safeguard to your electronics and devices. Remember to check if your home has surge-protecting devices, such as power strips or wholehome suppressors, to create a safety barrier when surges occur."

#### 404. Member Petition-Form Information

- (a) Each petition shall contain the following:
- 1. The name of the member nominee.
- 2. The director position for which the member nominee shall run.
- 3. The printed names, addresses and telephone numbers, date of signature and original signatures of each member signing the petition.
- 4. At least 10 signatures of the members of the respective district, or members at large, as the case may be.
- (b) In the case of joint members, the signature of one or more than one joint member shall constitute one joint member.
- (c) Firms, associations, corporations or body politics shall have the right to place one signature on a petition, the same as other members, by the signature of a duly appointed representative.
- (d) Petitions may not be circulated or signed more than 60 days before the date when petitions must be filed pursuant to this bylaw. Any signatures to a nominating

petition obtained more than 60 days before that date may not be counted.

- (e) All petitions must be filed at the principal offices of the cooperative not less than 90 days prior to the date of the meeting of the members, as fixed by the board of directors.
- (f) After verifying that a petition complies with this bylaw, the secretary of the board of directors shall post a list of nominations for directors at the principal office of the cooperative at least 60 days before the meeting of the members.

If you would like to place your name on the ballot, pick up a petition at the KEM Electric Cooperative office or download a petition from the cooperative website at www.kemelectric.com. Petitions must be returned to the cooperative office no later than March 13. As a reminder, nominations from the floor will not be accepted.



## KEM Electric board meeting highlights **Dec. 19, 2023**

The December meeting of the board of directors of KEM Electric Cooperative was held on Dec. 19, 2023, at the KEM Electric office building in Linton. President Victor Wald called the meeting to order at 9:37 a.m. A quorum was present. Also present were KEM Electric's co-General Managers/CEOs Travis Kupper and Jason Bentz, Chief Financial Officer Alex Craigmile, Legal Counsel Tom Bair, Chief of Staff/Line Superintendent Dale Nagel, Member Relations Manager Marcy Sanders and Executive Assistant Connie Hill.

**Consent agenda:** There was a proposed addition to the consent agenda. The consent agenda was approved as amended.

**Strategic/action:** Bentz and Kupper presented the co-general managers' report, which included updates from various meetings attended. A Basin Electric Power Cooperative CEO report was also provided for

the board to review.

**Action items:** The board discussed end-of-the-year items, such as notices, load forecasts and audits.

**Department reports:** Nagel provided a department report, which included outage reports and safety statistics for December. Sanders presented a department report, an annual meeting update and a report on the January local pages. Dunbar provided a report, which included IT training. Bair reviewed a legal report with the board.

**Executive session:** The board entered into an executive session.

The meeting concluded with the adjournment and Secretary-Treasurer Carter Vander Wal certified the accuracy of the minutes.

**Next meeting date**: The next meeting date is set for Jan. 17 at BEK Communications in Steele.
